**MAY PROGRAM - LET'S GO FISHING**

It's time to get together and do some fishing. The hungry Perch, Bass and a few other species await us at Latham Springs, just ask Coach Menefee.

For the club members who have fished at Latham Springs before all you need to know is we will start about 4:00 pm and fish until sunset. If you have not fished at Latham Springs before, this is your chance to give it a try. Knock on wood, but we have not had a bad day of fishing (catching) at Latham Springs although some days have been better than others.

There are plenty of Bass and a few Crappie in the lake, but many of us target the big Perch. Think slow retrieves for those Perch. You can fish from the bank, but a watercraft will allow you to cover more water. This outing is strictly fishing so if you need snacks or fluids, bring them. Everything except alcoholic beverages that is, which are not permitted.



Directions from Waco: I 35 north to the FM 2114/Downtown West exit 353. Then turn west onto FM 2114. Proceed west for approximately 12 miles and turn onto the camp road by the Latham Springs Baptist Camp sign.

If you have a viable candidate for club membership, bring him or her along. This is a great place for a beginner to catch some fish.

### **APRIL PROGRAM - ALASKA**

Our goal is to provide quality programs for our monthly meetings, programs that are entertaining and informative. The club officers worry about that, but get a month off when our speaker is Chris Johnson. We know that Chris always comes through and our April program was no exception.

Chris and his wife, Emily, made a budget conscious trip to Alaska and proved it can be done. That means they didn't spend a small fortune, but caught plenty of fish and took in many amazing sights. Chris told us how they did it.

They cheated a little by staying with Chris' brother in Anchorage, but even adding in a Best Western caliber hotel this is a weeklong trip that can be done for a total of \$1,500 - \$2,000 per person. The place to start is [cheaptickets.com](http://cheaptickets.com). Be flexible with your search by using a search function on the website that allows you to look at ticket prices three days before and after the dates you plug in. With this kind of planning you should be able to find roundtrip tickets in the \$500 per person range, not the \$1,400 range we all think of as the cost of air travel to Alaska. Chris paid \$395 roundtrip.

Of course, Chris is a Texas fly fishing guide (and a good one), but he does not consider himself to be an Alaskan guide so he checked in with Mossy's Fly Shop in Anchorage for advice and flies. There was a pizza involved at nearby Moose's Tooth Pizza.

Chris and Emily never traveled more than two hours from Anchorage and caught everything from Grayling to Pink Salmon, with Emily maintaining her tradition of out fishing Chris. They had to do a little hiking to get the Grayling, but most of their fishing was easily accessed and

uncrowded. The pictures Chris showed during his talk often included signs of civilization, but not other fishermen. In one case they were almost under a bridge, Salmon in hand.

If you are not a fly fisher of Chris or Emily's caliber you might consider the extra expense of a day of guided fishing early in your trip to accelerate your learning curve. If you want to give this type of Alaskan fishing a try you should definitely contact Chris at Living Waters Fly Fishing for more information. The wealth of information that Chris provided in his talk is beyond the scope of this newsletter.

One thing that was notable was Chris's excitement over this Alaskan trip. Now Chris is passionate when it comes to all fly fishing, but you could tell that this was a special trip for him.

### **PROJECT HEALING WATERS - RIGHT HERE IN WACO**

We all know that there is something special about all things fly fishing. Even when you can't actually wet a line, messing with your tackle or tying a few flies seems to knock a few points off your blood pressure. It can be therapeutic, healing even, taking your mind off whatever it is that is troubling you.

For more than a year now, Bill Adams has been helping our military veterans take advantage of the benefits of tying a few flies at the Waco VA's PTSD program on the first and third Mondays of the each month. Tying starts at noon and continues until 3:00 pm. In addition to just having an opportunity to share our sport, you get to share it with somebody who has given so much. In fact, some tyers regularly come from Georgetown and College Station to lend a hand.

### **A TRICK THAT WORKS**

John Gierach is one of my favorite authors. He is definitely my favorite outdoor writer. I read his books for enjoyment, but usually learn something without really even knowing it.

Years ago I read about the Woolly Bugger trick in one of Gierach's books. The trick is simple, on Trout water, cast and strip a Woolly Bugger beginning around sunset.

Sometime after reading that I was having a slow day on the San Juan River. A slow day there isn't all that bad, but you get a bit disappointed because slow days there are unusual and you can't help but wonder if you're just a crappy fisherman because you are, after all, on the San Juan. You can see lots of big Trout everywhere and there is that reputation of large body counts.

Somehow I remembered the Woolly Bugger trick and decided to give it a try as the sun set. After staring at a strike indicator all day, it was a relief to be able to enjoy the scenery for a change. The resident wildlife starts getting active about this time of day which adds to the pleasure of having the damn indicator in a pocket.



I admit that I was skeptical at first, but those highly educated, snobbish San Juan Trout that had been giving me the fin all day started hammering the Woolly Buggers. I use the plural, because Trout are aggressive when they attack Woolly Buggers. I broke off several at the strike before I seriously upgraded my tippet to something like 4X, maybe even heavier than that.

As Gierach puts it in his book *Standing in a River Waving a Stick*:

"Then at dark we'd go to one of the big, slow pools and cast size-4 Woolly Buggers to the trout that had spooked at tiny dries on 7X tippets in the daylight. It's a trick that works more often than not, and I always think, as I'm releasing one of those big trout, There, you're not so damned smart after all, are you?"

If you are headed for some Trout water this summer give the Woolly Bugger trick a try, you just might end the day with a few more fish. There is another benefit to the trick. The Trout you hook this way seem to put up a more aggressive fight. My theory is that the fish take Woolly Buggers in a predatory mode rather than the casually sipping little bugs mode. They are fired up before you even set the hook.
